If your submission is selected, you will be contacted and sent a waiver form allowing the Town to use your photos.




Annual Town Meeting Is Scheduled for May 14, at 7 PM at King Philip Middle School, 18 King Street

While Town Meetings in Massachusetts vary by form of government and size, the one constant theme is the responsibility of taxpayers to make their voices heard to decide the right course of governing for their community.



Busy 2024 Ahead for the Town Clerk's Office

As we begin the new year, there are a few things to look for. First is the annual town census. As well as being required under Massachusetts General Law, responding to the census helps you with proof of residency as well as voting rights. If you do not return your signed census, we are required to inactivate you as a voter which adds more paperwork for you if you still live in town and show up to vote. So, get your census checked, signed, and returned to the office (either in the drop box, or by mail) so you will have a smooth and easy voting experience on election day.

Speaking of Election Day, we have plenty of those in 2024. From the Primary in March and the Town Election in May to the State Primary in September and the General in November, everyone should have plenty of opportunities to exercise their right to vote!

Dog licensing in Norfolk is on a calendar year basis; therefore, all 2023 licenses expire on December 31. It seems that everyone is waiting on pins and needles to see what the 2024 tag is going to look like, but dog owners will have to send in the completed registration, a copy of a current rabies vaccination, and payment to find out.

Affordable Housing

Retire-in-Place Assistance Program Funded by Norfolk Municipal Affordable **Housing Trust**

A new Retire-in-Place Assistance (RIPA) program is now available to Norfolk residents. The RIPA program provides limited financial assistance to income-eligible senior or disabled households to help repair and rehabilitate existing owner-occupied housing units. The grant limit is \$5,000 per applicant, or per household.

The application period for this funding round opens Jan. 5, 2024 and closes Feb. 15, 2024.

Grants are reviewed and awarded once per year. Norfolk residents who are interested in applying can acquire an application by emailing Affordable Housing Trust Director Susan Jacobson at sjacobson@norfolk.ma.us. Applications will also be made available at the Town Hall.

Recreation

Norfolk Recreation prides itself on having something for everyone, and this winter is no exception! Registration is underway for the winter session with programs beginning in the new year. Along with all of our popular returning programs, we are excited to offer new, Saturday programs including Sticky Fingers (parent with child), Creative Kids Crafts (age 3.5-6yrs), and American Sign Language (for children and adults). Zoombinis for grades 3-6 is being offered in conjunction with the NPS Tech Department. Call for Artists



Council on Aging

Property Tax Work-Off Program 2024

Applications are currently available for participation in the property tax work-off program. The program's goals are to assist senior citizens with property tax bills, reduce Town departments' workloads because they are staffed with skilled and dependable seniors, allow seniors the chance to put their skills to use, and assist seniors with opportunities for socialization and a sense of purpose. Participants must meet eligibility guidelines and have appropriate skills for available positions. Participants may work for a Town department up to 100 hours between January 2024 and November 2024 and earn a credit of \$15 per hour which will be applied to their February 1 tax bill in 2025. Types of past positions available include program leaders, administrative, reception, data entry, document scanning, library assistance and project assistance, for various Town departments.

Program Requirements:

- Must be 60 years or older as of January 1, 2024
- Must fully complete the application
- Must pass a CORI background check and present a photo ID with the application
- Must own and occupy a property in Norfolk and present a tax bill with the application
- Property must NOT be held in a trust unless the person applying for the program has a beneficial interest in the trust

Job Opportunity

This non-benefited position is 5-16 hours per month and is responsible for providing transportation for Norfolk's seniors and disabled residents to and from appointed destinations.
